

More than two decades ago, Paul Newman had a vision: *imagine if children living with serious illness had the chance to simply be children. To just have fun. So he started a camp where kids could, in his words, "raise a little hell"*.

Initially Paul set up two camps in the USA but could clearly see a demand from Europe for similar services. So Paul turned his attention to finding a suitable location for the first European camp. The then Taoiseach Albert Reynolds invited Paul to see Barretstown Castle. The story goes he saw our fairy-tale castle on a beautiful day and fell in love with Barretstown and its potential.

During our first year, in 1994, we served 120 campers, now each year we are serving over 6,000 both here in Barretstown and around Ireland through our Outreach Programmes in hospitals, schools and communities throughout Ireland. *Our ambitions* continue, as we develop our amazing site here in Co Kildare and constantly strive to reach more children living with serious illness.

Today, we continue Paul's legacy as an independently financed and independently managed camp, and a proud member of the SeriousFun Children's Network.



Our Mission & Impact

Barretstown's mission is to rebuild the lives of children affected by serious illness and their families. We believe that every child with a serious illness should enjoy their childhood.

Barretstown offers free, specially designed camps and programmes for children and their families living with a serious illness – supported behind the scenes by 24 hour on site medical and nursing care. All of the children and families come to Barretstown free of charge. Everything, including accommodation, food, medical assistance and travel costs are provided at no cost to the family.

The Barretstown programme is endorsed by leading medical professionals and has become internationally recognised as having a profound and lasting impact on the lives of children with serious illness. After participating, children go home with increased confidence, self-esteem and the skills they need to face the rest of their journey to recovery.

Our Vision for the Future

Higher rates of cancer diagnosis and improved survival rates are leading to an increase in demand for our services, as more and more children and families face the long road through treatment.

Our core objectives for the coming years are to:

- Extend our camp calendar year round and expand our site facilities to allow us bring more campers to each camp. This will help to reduce our waiting lists as we regularly have over 100 families waiting for places on our Family Weekend Camps.
- Expand the illness groups we serve, to maximise the unique facilities and programmes we are lucky to have here in Barretstown.
- Extend and expand our Outreach
 Programmes these programmes
 bring the hopeful spirit of Barretstown
 beyond the castle gates to hospitals,
 schools and communities throughout
 Ireland.
- Ensure that every child and family who wants to come to Barretstown to undertake our Therapeutic Recreation programmes can do so, to aid them on their road to recovery.

Case Studies

Brenda EngPaediatric Oncology Nurse, and Barretstown volunteer

Brenda first started to volunteer at a camp in British Columbia, Canada, which was started by her own godmother, Lois Youngson.

Since 1997, Brenda has been travelling to Ireland to volunteer as a nurse in the Med Shed at Barretstown, and it is this experience which has inspired her to leave a legacy to Barretstown in her will. Here is what Brenda has to say...

"From day one when I began my paediatric nursing career I felt that we needed to do everything possible to support children physically, emotionally, socially and psychologically. The illness and subsequent hospitalisations take away the child's childhood: to play, to learn, to be confident, and to be independent. Camp gives kids back their childhood. The philosophy of caring for children with life threatening illness really integrates with the camp experience. That is why I volunteer.

It is an honor and privilege to be invited back every year. I bring my years of experience as a paediatric nurse to children with life threatening illness, but I come away so much richer.

There is something only those who go to camp understand: camp magic. The best of humanity is felt here. It is my humble honour and privilege to pay it back and pay it forward to a camp and country that holds a piece of my heart and soul, by leaving a legacy."

James first became involved with Barretstown as an employee of Smithkline Beechham (now GlaxoSmithKline). James was tasked with the responsibility of overhauling the company's community involvement strategy. He decided that most of the philanthropy should be driven by the businesses, and therefore he proposed that they create three Divisions to achieve this end with Europe focusing on children's health. The decision to focus on children's health happened to coincide with a meeting of pharmaceutical and healthcare companies hosted by Barretstown in 1995. James was inspired, and immediately saw the benefits of SmithKline Beecham partnering with an organisation like Barretstown. GlaxoSmithKline still support Barretstown to this day.

James is also a supporter on a personal level, and has decided to leave a legacy to Barretstown, James tells us why:

"Helping those dear children to embrace a fun childhood which most of us have enjoyed and yet which has been cruelly denied so many of the children who come to Barretstown."

How to leave a gift in your will to Barretstown – it's so easy

A bequest or a legacy, is a gift, no matter how big or small, that you make in your will to your favourite charities.

After you've ensured that your family is taken care of, leaving a gift to Barretstown will stand as a wonderful testament to your support for other families: those with children living with, and recovering from, cancer and other serious illness.

If you're considering leaving a legacy to Barretstown, the first thing you should do is consult your solicitor for advice.

There are two main types of legacies:-

- Leaving a % of your estate sometimes called a residuary legacy, or leaving a specific amount of money – sometimes called a pecuniary legacy.
- If you already have a will, it's easy to amend it to include a legacy to Barretstown. This change is called a codicil and can be drawn up easily by your solicitor.









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Finding a Solicitor

Finding a solicitor is very straightforward. If you already have a solicitor, the first step is a simple as a phone call to set up an appointment.

If not, you'll need to find a solicitor who will draw up a will for you. This is easy as it's one of the basic services that almost all solicitors provide. A full list of all practicing solicitors throughout Ireland can be found at The Law Society (www.lawsociety.ie/find-a-solicitor).

You can also choose to visit mylegacy.ie where you can find a useful map of solicitors in Ireland. This site also contains clear information about making a will and leaving a legacy.
